



# Fiscal Year 2011-12 Fact Sheet · District 11

## Mid-Year Update

DPW is responsible for the care and maintenance of San Francisco's streets and much of its infrastructure. The department designs, builds, resurfaces and cleans streets; plants and maintains city street trees; designs, constructs and maintains city-owned facilities; conducts sidewalk and roadway inspections, constructs curb ramps, provides mechanical and manual street cleaning, removes graffiti from public property; and partners with the diverse neighborhoods in San Francisco. DPW serves residents, merchants and visitors 24 hours a day and seven days a week with a workforce of approximately 1,200 employees.

**Community Clean Team** Last event at Brotherhood Way, March 10, 2012, 9:00am-12pm

Clean Team dedicates a month to each district where volunteers remove litter and graffiti, plant trees, and help take care of our busy streets, schools, and community gardens.

Volunteers will help beautify the commercial area by keeping trees healthy and paint over graffiti on trash cans.

**Adopt A Street** is a partnership between the City and its merchants and residents to adopt a street or an area and take responsibility for keeping it clean.

**Street Parks Program** is a partnership between DPW and its non-profit partners (San Francisco Parks Trust and Street Parks Youth) to support community-managed public open-space gardens.

**Grffiti Watch** is a program to keep graffiti off of public property in San Francisco. DPW provides free training and supplies.

**Urban Gleaning Program** allows residents to donate from their fruit trees or garden to help DPW collect food for distribution to communities in need in San Francisco.

### Community Corridors Partnership Program

The Community Corridors Partnership Program is a collaboration between the City and property owners and merchants to improve the quality of life on busy San Francisco streets by cleaning sidewalks, removing graffiti, providing education and outreach; and repairing streets and sidewalks. The program's **Spruce Up by Sun Up Campaign** includes early morning inspections of streets in the Corridors program. The visits ensure that city ordinances that affect the quality of life on our streets are being met to keep streets in the Community Corridors Partnership Program clean and inviting for residents, customers and other visitors.


DPW paves city streets and builds and repairs sidewalks, curbs, curb ramps, and parking strips to provide safe, smooth, and accessible streets. DPW's paving strategy also includes Flex Seal, an application made from recycled tire rubber that can cost-effectively extend the life of our streets. Candidates for street repaving are subject to utility clearances/coordination and the availability of funding.

### 2011 Road Repair and Street Safety Bond [sfdpw.org/streetsbond](http://sfdpw.org/streetsbond)

In November 2011, San Francisco residents passed the \$248 million Road Repair & Street Safety Bond. It will repave streets; repair deteriorating bridges, overpasses and staircases; improve streetscapes for pedestrian and bicyclist safety; improve traffic flow on local streets; and install sidewalk and curb ramps.

There will be paving improvements through the bond to approx. 400 blocks this year across San Francisco; totaling 700 blocks through bond and non-bond funded resources.

## Sidewalk Inspection and Repair (SIRP) [sfdpw.org/SIRP](http://sfdpw.org/SIRP)

DPW works with property owners to keep their sidewalks free of defects to improve safety and comply with City and State codes. The SIRP program accomplishes this by coordinating sidewalk inspections, repairs and improvements.

Proposed inspections to be conducted in District Eleven within a 12 square block area bordered by Silver Ave, Edinburg Street, Brazil Ave & Mission Street.

## Capital Projects [sfdpw.org/projects](http://sfdpw.org/projects)

DPW delivers major capital projects through planning, design, regulatory approval, and the construction processes. The department delivers a variety of projects on behalf of City agencies. Major capital projects are funded through local, state or federal public financing programs, and occasionally in combination with local matching or private funds. DPW delivers complex capital projects with aggressive schedules and extensive review and approval processes.

**Cayuga Playground Renovation** DPW designed the renovation and will be managing construction of this playground on behalf of Recreation and Parks Department. The project workscope includes the repair and/or renovation of the courts, play area, and clubhouse; restoration of existing roads and pathways; upgrades to the irrigation and lighting systems; improved accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape. Construction is scheduled for completion in 2012.

**Athens and Avalon Hillside Improvements** DPW designed new retaining walls, a new sidewalk and drainage system to prevent erosion and stabilize the hillside for general safety. Construction is expected to be completed by summer 2012.

**Fire Station 15** DPW will manage the design and construction of Fire Station 15, 1000 Ocean Avenue. The seismic renovation is part of the Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response (ESER) bond. For more info.: [sfearthquakesafety.org](http://sfearthquakesafety.org)

DPW issued 63 permits to property owners to plant and remove trees in District 11.

Year to date, in District 11, DPW has issued 1 permit to a property owner to install sidewalk landscaping.
