Mid-Year Update

DPW is responsible for the care and maintenance of San Francisco's streets and much of its infrastructure. The department designs, builds, resurfaces and cleans streets; plants and maintains city street trees; designs, constructs and maintains city-owned facilities; conducts sidewalk and roadway inspections, constructs curb ramps, provides mechanical and manual street cleaning, removes graffiti from public property; and partners with the diverse neighborhoods in San Francisco. DPW serves residents, merchants and visitors 24 hours a day and seven days a week with a workforce of approximately 1,200 employees.

Adopt A Street is a partnership between the City and its merchants and residents to adopt a street or an area and take responsibility for keeping it clean.

Street Parks Program is a partnership between DPW and its non-profit partners (San Francisco Parks Trust and Street Parks Youth) to support community-managed public open-space gardens.

Graffiti Watch is a program to keep graffiti off of public property in San Francisco. DPW provides free training and supplies.

Urban Gleaning Program allows residents to donate from their fruit trees or garden to help DPW collect food for distribution to communities in need in San Francisco.


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Community Corridors Partnership Program

The Community Corridors Partnership Program is a collaboration between the City and property owners and merchants to improve the quality of life on busy San Francisco streets by cleaning sidewalks, removing graffiti, providing education and outreach; and repairing streets and sidewalks. The program's **Spruce Up by Sun Up Campaign** includes early morning inspections of streets in the Corridors program. The visits ensure that city ordinances that affect the quality of life on our streets are being met to keep streets in the Community Corridors Partnership Program clean and inviting for residents, customers and other visitors.

Streets & Paving sfdpw.org/streets

DPW paves city streets and builds and repairs sidewalks, curbs, curb ramps, and parking strips to provide safe, smooth, and accessible streets. DPW's paving strategy also includes Flex Seal, an application made from recycled tire rubber that can cost-effectively extend the life of our streets. Candidates for street repaving are subject to utility clearances/coordination and the availability of funding.

2011 Road Repair and Street Safety Bond

In November 2011, San Francisco residents passed the \$248 million Road Repair & Street Safety Bond. It will repave streets; repair deteriorating bridges, overpasses and staircases; improve streetscapes for pedestrian and bicyclist safety; improve traffic flow on local streets; and install sidewalk and curb ramps.

There will be paving improvements through the bond to approx. 400 blocks this year across San Francisco; totaling 700 blocks through bond and non-bond funded resources.

Sidewalk Inspection and Repair (SIRP) sfdpw.org/SIRP

DPW works with property owners to keep their sidewalks free of defects to improve safety and comply with City and State codes. The SIRP program accomplishes this by coordinating sidewalk inspections, repairs and improvements. The department responds to Complaints in this area.

Capital Projects sfdpw.org/projects

DPW delivers major capital projects through planning, design, regulatory approval, and the construction processes. The department delivers a variety of projects on behalf of City agencies. Major capital projects are funded through local, state or federal public financing programs, and occasionally in combination with local matching or private funds. DPW delivers complex capital projects with aggressive schedules and extensive review and approval processes.

Cargo Way Bicycle Improvements Project DPW recently completed the new bicycle lane added to Cargo Way in the Bayview. This bikeway extends a little over half a mile from 3rd Street to Jennings St. The project is part of the San Francisco Bay Trail and a new addition to SF's Bicycle Route Network. The bikeway will provide a vital link to the India Basin, Hunters Point, and Bayview communities, as well as the lovely Heron's Head Park.

Bayview Branch Library (1) DPW is managing the construction of this new library. The project will include a new one-story building with separate adult, teen, and children's areas built around a central courtyard; increased space to accommodate an expanded collection; a study room; a program room with after hour's access for library programs and community events; public art; lots of light; and many environmental features. Visitacion Valley Branch Library (2) DPW designed and managed this new library which includes a large program room, separate areas for children, teens, and adults, outside courtyards, natural lighting and ventilation, and is slated to reach a LEED Silver designation. The branch opened July 30, 2011. For more info.: sfpl.org

San Francisco General Hospital Rebuild (3) DPW is project managing the rebuild of San Francisco General Hospital. The rebuild replaces the existing general acute care hospital with a nine-story facility that meets state requirements for seismic safety. Currently under construction and is scheduled to be completed and operational in 2015.

Potrero Hill Health Center DPW designed and managed the construction of this health center, which will create a new 1,050 square foot facility next to the existing building. This addition provides examination and consultation rooms, a conference room and office, and exterior improvements. The project will allow continued unparallel medical services for the community. The first phase of the project was completed fall 2010 with the second phase completed in 2011.



Newcomb Avenue Streetscape Improvements (4) On behalf of the former SF Redevelopment Agency and in partnership with the Planning Department and SFPUC, DPW enhanced and beautified Newcomb Avenue transformed a barren strip of concrete into an urban oasis and created gathering places for residents. Work included landscaping to provide green areas, storm water management, permeable surfaces and a dense canopy of street trees. The project was completed in December 2011.

Fire Stations 17 and 44 DPW will manage the design and construction of Fire Stations 17 and 44, 1295 Shafter Street. The renovations are part of the voter supported Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response (ESER) bond. More info.: sfearthquakesafety.org

Emergency Logistics Center DPW will manage the design and construction of the Emergency Logistics Center (ELC), 1145 Evans Street, as part of the Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response (ESER) bond. Completed in December 2011.
