Mid-Year Update

DPW is responsible for the care and maintenance of San Francisco's streets and much of its infrastructure. The department designs, builds, resurfaces and cleans streets; plants and maintains city street trees; designs, constructs and maintains city-owned facilities; conducts sidewalk and roadway inspections, constructs curb ramps, provides mechanical and manual street cleaning, removes graffiti from public property; and partners with the diverse neighborhoods in San Francisco. DPW serves residents, merchants and visitors 24 hours a day and seven days a week with a workforce of approximately 1,200 employees.

Clean Team dedicates a month to each district where volunteers remove litter and graffiti, plant trees, and help take care of our busy streets, schools, and community gardens.

Location: Fillmore St (Geary and Turk)
Volunteers will help beautify the commercial area by keeping trees healthy and paint over graffiti on trash cans.

Adopt A Street is a partnership between the City and its merchants and residents to adopt a street or an area and take responsibility for keeping it clean.

Street Parks Program is a partnership between DPW and its non-profit partners (San Francisco Parks Trust and Street Parks Youth) to support community-managed public open-space gardens.

Grffiti Watch is a program to keep graffiti off of public property in San Francisco. DPW provides free training and supplies.


Urban Gleaning Program allows residents to donate from their fruit trees or garden to help DPW collect food for distribution to communities in need in San Francisco.

Community Corridors Partnership Program

The Community Corridors Partnership Program is a collaboration between the City and property owners and merchants to improve the quality of life on busy San Francisco streets by cleaning sidewalks, removing graffiti, providing education and outreach; and repairing streets and sidewalks. The program's **Spruce Up by Sun Up Campaign** includes early morning inspections of streets in the Corridors program. The visits ensure that city ordinances that affect the quality of life on our streets are being met to keep streets in the Community Corridors Partnership Program clean and inviting for residents, customers and other visitors.

Streets and Paving sfdpw.org/streets

DPW paves city streets and builds and repairs sidewalks, curbs, curb ramps, and parking strips to provide safe, smooth, and accessible streets. DPW's paving strategy also includes Flex Seal, an application made from recycled tire rubber that can cost-effectively extend the life of our streets. Candidates for street repaving are subject to utility clearances/coordination and the availability of funding.

2011 Road Repair and Street Safety Bond sfdpw.org/streetsbond

In November 2011, San Francisco residents passed the \$248 million Road Repair & Street Safety Bond. It will repave streets; repair deteriorating bridges, overpasses and staircases; improve streetscapes for pedestrian and bicyclist safety; improve traffic flow on local streets; and install sidewalk and curb ramps.

There will be paving improvements through the bond to over 1,400 street segments in every neighborhood across San Francisco (in addition to the 900 street segments through other funding sources for a total of 2,300 blocks improved over three years). The bond is expected to create over 1,000 jobs.

Sidewalk Inspection and Repair (SIRP) sfdpw.org/SIRP

DPW works with property owners to keep their sidewalks free of defects to improve safety and comply with City and State codes. The SIRP program accomplishes this by coordinating sidewalk inspections, repairs and improvements.

- Upcoming inspections will be conducted in District Five within a 19 square block area bounded by Geary/Fell Streets, Laguna/Gough Streets, Eddy/Market Streets and Steiner/Octavia Streets.

Capital Projects sfdpw.org/projects

DPW delivers major capital projects through planning, design, regulatory approval, and the construction processes. The department delivers a variety of projects on behalf of City agencies. Major capital projects are funded through local, state or federal public financing programs, and occasionally in combination with local matching or private funds. DPW delivers complex capital projects with aggressive schedules and extensive review and approval processes.

Park Branch Library (1) On behalf of the San Francisco Public Library, DPW managed the remodel of this library, which preserved the historic character of the building while incorporating new, accessible restrooms; more defined areas for children, teens, and adults; new and restored furniture; increased capacity for books and other materials, a children's area with interactive early learning features; more functional & ergonomic staff work areas; reconfigured program room with state-of-the-art audio visual equipment; additional computers; new heating system and upgraded electrical & data systems and much more. This branch is the first to receive Gold LEED certification. It opened on February 26, 2011.



Raymond Kimball Playground Renovation (2) DPW is initiating the design of the renovation of this playground on behalf of Recreation and Parks Department. The project is currently in the community and conceptual planning phase and includes plans to repair and/or renovate the restroom facilities, the children's play area, picnic area and courts; restore the roads and pathways; upgrade lighting and irrigation; improve accessibility; and reconditioning of the park landscape.

Alamo Square Restroom On behalf of the Recreation and Park Department, DPW is managing the design and construction of a new restroom building and site improvements for universal access.

Fire Station 5 DPW will manage the design and construction of Fire Station 5 at 1301 Turk Street. This seismic renovation is part of the Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response (ESER) bond.

Fire Station 22 DPW will manage the design and construction of Fire Station 22 at 1290 16th Avenue. This seismic renovation is part of the Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response (ESER) bond.
