



# Fiscal Year 2011-12 Fact Sheet · District 1

## Mid-Year Update

DPW is responsible for the care and maintenance of San Francisco's streets and much of its infrastructure. The department designs, builds, resurfaces and cleans streets; plants and maintains city street trees; designs, constructs and maintains city-owned facilities; conducts sidewalk and roadway inspections, constructs curb ramps, provides mechanical and manual street cleaning, removes graffiti from public property; and partners with the diverse neighborhoods in San Francisco. DPW serves residents, merchants and visitors 24 hours a day and seven days a week with a workforce of approximately 1,200 employees.

Clean Team dedicates a month to each district where volunteers remove litter and graffiti, plant trees, and help take care of our busy streets, schools, and community gardens.

Location: Grass Greenbelt at Funston/Geary at Park Presidio, Geary - 7th to Fulton. Volunteers will weed, plant and chip medians.

**Adopt A Street** is a partnership between the City and its merchants and residents to adopt a street or an area and take responsibility for keeping it clean.

**Street Parks Program** is a partnership between DPW and its non-profit partners (San Francisco Parks Trust and Street Parks Youth) to support community-managed public open-space gardens.

**Graffiti Watch** is a program to keep graffiti off of public property in San Francisco. DPW provides free training and supplies.

**Urban Gleaning Program** allows residents to donate from their fruit trees or garden to help DPW collect food for distribution to communities in need in San Francisco.



### Community Corridors Partnership Program

The Community Corridors Partnership Program is a collaboration between the City and property owners and merchants to improve the quality of life on busy San Francisco streets by cleaning sidewalks, removing graffiti, providing education and outreach; and repairing streets and sidewalks. The program's **Spruce Up by Sun Up Campaign** includes early morning inspections of streets in the Corridors program. The visits ensure that city ordinances that affect the quality of life on our streets are being met to keep streets in the Community Corridors Partnership Program clean and inviting for residents, customers and other visitors.

### Streets & Paving [sfdpw.org/streets](http://sfdpw.org/streets)

DPW paves city streets and builds and repairs sidewalks, curbs, curb ramps, and parking strips to provide safe, smooth, and accessible streets. DPW's paving strategy also includes Flex Seal, an application made from recycled tire rubber that can cost-effectively extend the life of our streets. Candidates for street repaving are subject to utility clearances/coordination and the availability of funding.

**Current Paving Projects:** Cabrillo St (25<sup>th</sup>-45<sup>th</sup>). Cabrillo Sewer Replacement (29<sup>th</sup>-30<sup>th</sup>, 36<sup>th</sup>-37<sup>th</sup>, 43<sup>rd</sup> to 45<sup>th</sup>).

**Upcoming projects:** Balboa St (Park Presidio-Great Highway); Anza St (2<sup>nd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup>, 27<sup>th</sup>-28<sup>th</sup>); Roselyn Ter (Turk-Golden Gate); Spruce St (Geary-Anza); 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave (Clement-Geary); 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave (Geary-Anza); 28<sup>th</sup> Ave (Clement-Geary); 28<sup>th</sup> Ave (Geary-Anza); 33<sup>rd</sup> Ave (Anza-Balboa).

### 2011 Road Repair and Street Safety Bond [sfdpw.org/streetsbond](http://sfdpw.org/streetsbond)

In November 2011, San Francisco residents passed the \$248 million Road Repair & Street Safety Bond. It will repave streets; repair deteriorating bridges, overpasses and staircases; improve streetscapes for pedestrian and bicyclist safety; improve traffic flow on local streets; and install sidewalk and curb ramps.

There will be paving improvements through the bond to over 1,400 street segments in every neighborhood across San Francisco (in addition to the 900 street segments through other funding sources for a total of 2,300 blocks improved over three years). The bond is expected to create over 1,000 jobs.

## Sidewalk Inspection and Repair (SIRP)

DPW works with property owners to keep their sidewalks free of defects to improve safety and comply with City and State codes. The SIRP program accomplishes this by coordinating sidewalk inspections, repairs and improvements.

- Three quarters of the way through 2011-12, DPW's proactive Sidewalk Inspection and Repair Program inspected 625,332 square feet of sidewalk and has repaired 89,052 square feet of sidewalk in District One.

## Capital Projects

DPW delivers major capital projects through planning, design, regulatory approval, and the construction processes. The department delivers a variety of projects on behalf of City agencies. Major capital projects are funded through local, state or federal public financing programs, and occasionally in combination with local matching or private funds. DPW delivers complex capital projects with aggressive schedules and extensive review and approval processes.

**Balboa Streetscape Improvement Project (1)** will extend from 34th to 39th Avenue along Balboa Street. Balboa serves as a vital commercial corridor for the surrounding Outer-Richmond District residential neighborhood. Improvements will include sidewalk bulb-outs, revised traffic and parking layout, light fixture upgrades, and street resurfacing. Project is in design phase and construction is scheduled to begin spring 2012.

**Point Lobos Streetscape Improvements** extend from 42nd Ave to 48th Ave. on Point Lobos. This corridor is a key gateway to the scenic western edge of the city, including the Cliff House and GGNRA. Improvements will include median construction, landscaping and sidewalk tree planting. The project is in design phase and construction is scheduled to begin late summer 2012.



**Cabrillo and Fulton Playground Renovations** DPW is initiating the design of these playgrounds' renovations on behalf of Recreation and Parks. The project workscope will include the repair and renovation of the clubhouse, the children's play areas, picnic area and courts; restoration of paving and pathways; upgrades to the infrastructure including lighting, modifications to improve accessibility, and overall reconditioning of the park landscape. Construction for Cabrillo is anticipated for spring 2012 with completion by Spring 2013. Fulton is currently under construction and is slated for completion in early 2013.

**Great Highway and Ocean Beach (4)** In late fall, DPW plans to repave the Great Highway, from 48th Avenue and Point Lobos Avenue to the upper Great Highway to Sloat Blvd. DPW is also looking to install street medians from Lincoln to Fulton along the Great Highway.

DPW is one of multiple agencies and stakeholders helping to develop a long term Ocean Beach Master Plan; which is being led by the SF Public Utilities Commission and the San Francisco Planning and Urban Research Association (SPUR).

**Anza Branch Library (3)** DPW, on behalf of the San Francisco Public Library, designed and managed the library's renovation, which included a small addition, new accessible restrooms, improved public and staff spaces, a new elevator, a designated Teen Area, better lighting, and new & refinished furniture, shelving, and materials displays. The library opened on June 18, 2011.

**Rossi Restroom Renovation** DPW, on behalf of the Recreation and Park Department is managing the design and renovation of the restroom building for universal access. Renovation includes a small addition, new accessible restrooms, improved public and staff spaces, a new elevator, a designated Teen Area, and better lighting.

**Fire Station 31** DPW will manage the design and construction of Fire Station 31, 441 12th Avenue, This comprehensive renovation as part of the Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response (ESER) bond.
